Abstract: As we commence our 35th year, we acknowledge our team and launch 2 new initiatives: Infographics and *Arthroscopy* Journal Podcasts.

In 2019, we introduce and celebrate Volume 35 of *Arthroscopy: The Journal of Arthroscopic and Related Surgery*. At the start of a new year, particularly our milestone 35th, it is tempting to look both forward and back.¹ However, as our growth and development accelerates,² having proudly lauded award winning past research,³ we turn our gaze unambiguously and explicitly forward.

Our new Editorial Board pages demand examination. We function as a team, most of the team are volunteers, and all are exemplary with regard to allegiance, aptitude, and artistry. Of particular note, our reliable, organized, accountable, and productive Assistant Managing Editor Deborah VanNoy has most deservedly been promoted to the position and title of Managing Editor.
